Call to Ministry

I was raised mostly in the Lutheran church, ELCA, attending a variety of churches due to frequent moves, as both parents were career military officers. I was a seeker, yet by my late teens I had come to define myself as "agnostic". Soon after I started college, I had a conversion experience

and heard God calling me to worship and church. Three years later, in my senior year, I realized that call was specifically to ordained ministry—and chose the United Methodist Church as my spiritual home.

Leadership Style

Ordained ministry as a role of facilitation, a calling to help other Christian to discover their own God-given call in the world. I strive to equip, inspire, and mentor laypersons for their personal journeys of discipleship. I am a Myers-Briggs ENFP—warm and touchy-feely in personal communications, and prefer open discussion and consensus for collective decision making. My evening practice is more meditative—using centering prayer, lectio divina, and other spiritual listening modalities as a way to center myself down into the rest of God.

I read a lot–nonfiction history–particularly ancient Near Eastern and medieval European history, fiction, poetry, popular science–especially bioecology and physics, theology and sociology, and a lot of genre mystery novels.
